To provide abused and neglected children with quality advocacy in the court system and to secure a safe, permanent, and nurturing home for them by recruiting, training and supporting a diverse network of Court Appointed Special Advocate volunteers.

OUR VISION

All children will thrive in a nurturing and loving family that provides them with a safe and permanent home. We will do so through high-quality advocacy and evidence-based programming supported by sustainable funding as a model non-profit for best practice in service, leadership, and operations.



Program Overview

The CASA of Hancock County Program is appointed to Youth Court cases by judicial order. Children who reside in Hancock County, are victims of abuse and neglect, and have involvement with Youth Court and Child Protective Services are eligible for CASA advocacy.



COURTHOUSE FACILITY DOG

Remi, Mississippi's only Courthouse Facility Dog, received extensive training from Canine Companions for Independence®, an assistance dog organization. These dogs are selected for their ability to calmly interact with people in a high stress environment. She and her handler Naomi Strawhorn received intensive training and complete ongoing assessments with Canine Companions®. The pair work as a team in providing services to child victims.

Remi goes to work daily at CASA of Hancock County. She primarily attends Youth Court with child victims and may accompany children to forensic interviews to enhance the fact-finding process. Off hours, Remi goes home with her handler and is a normal pet.

STEWARDS OF CHILDREN®

The Stewards of Children® training empowers adults to prevent, recognize, and react responsibly to child sexual abuse through awareness, education, and stigma reduction. For every person trained in this curriculum, ten children are protected from becoming victims of child sexual abuse.

CASA of Hancock County's Executive Director Cynthia Chauvin & Lead Advocate Supervisor Lauren Saucier are trained facilitators of this curriculum and provide the Stewards of Children training to organizations within the community to prevent child sexual abuse.



TRUST-BASED RELATIONAL INTERVENTION®

Trust-Based Relational Intervention®, or TBRI®, is a trauma-informed intervention designed to meet the complex needs of vulnerable children. CASA of Hancock County's Victim Services Coordinator Naomi Strawhorn offers TBRI Caregiver training for foster parents to help them understand, address, and respond to the challenging behaviors of the children placed in their homes.

In addition to these classes, CASA offers ongoing support and parent coaching to prevent placement disruption for our children in custody.

Brittany Fortmayer



82 of these children were assigned an advocate


Additionally, CASA served 28 children in alternate custody or in-home cases





The CASA Volunteer Pre-Service training curriculum is facilitated throughout the year. The curriculum consists of (30) thirty hours of training, court observation, and background screening.

SATISFACTION SURVEYS

In February 2021, CASA sent out satisfaction surveys to advocates, stakeholders, and children:

ADVOCATE SURVEYS



Training

83% of advocates "Strongly Agree" that they have received adequate training. 13% indicated "Agree."



Support

96% of advocates "Strongly Agree" that their supervisor is helpful & keeps them updated on case information.



Retention

96% of advocates "Strongly Agree" that they will continue being a CASA. The rest marked "Agree."

Collaboration

When asked if CASAs share information and seek collaboration at appropriate times, 89% marked Strongly Agree or Agree.



Influence

When asked if CASAs provide information that affects the way they see the case, 100% marked Strongly Agree or Agree.



Respect

When asked if CASAs are respected by the Judge, 100% marked Strongly Agree or Agree.


