423

Total Children Appointed to the CASA Program

Case Assignments

- Of the **423** children, **307** new children were appointed during this year.
- 352 children assigned an advocate
- **71** children were unserved during this reporting period.

Advocate Service

- 261 Court Reports written by Advocates
 - 946 Recommendations were made
 - 95% became Orders of the Court
- 133 Assigned Advocates
- 34 New Advocates Sworn In

Permanency

During this year, **153 children's** cases closed. Of these children, 94% achieved permanent homes through:

- 101 Reunification
- 35 Adoption
- 8 Durable Legal Custody

The outcomes for the other 6% were:

- 8 Children Turned 18/21 and were released from custody
- 1 Child Ran Away








HARRISON COUNTY



CHILDREN APPOINTED TO CASA



CHILD DEMOGRAPHICS



LOCATION OF ABUSE & NEGLECT







REMI THE COURTHOUSE FACILITY DOG

Remi, Mississippi's only Courthouse Facility Dog, received extensive training from Canine Companions®. Facility dogs like Remi are selected for their ability to calmly interact with people in a high stress environment. Remi goes to work daily alongside her handler Naomi Strawhorn, Victim Services Coordinator at CASA. While Remi primarily attends Youth Court with child victims, she may also accompany children to forensic interviews to enhance the fact-finding process. Off hours, Remi goes home with her handler and is a normal pet. Visit www.canine.org to find out more about the Canine Companions program.

TRUST-BASED RELATIONAL INTERVENTION®

Trust-Based Relational Intervention, or TBRI®, is a trauma-informed intervention designed to meet the complex needs of vulnerable children. Victim Services Coordinator Naomi Strawhorn offers this training to help parents & professionals understand, address, and respond to the challenging behaviors of the children placed in their homes.

In addition, Naomi Strawhorn has partnered with other TBRI® Practitioners to create a multi-agency collaborative to implement system-wide traumainformed training within the state of Mississippi.

In 2024, CASA of South Mississippi was recognized as a TBRI Ambassador Organization in partnership with the Karyn Purvis Institute of Child Development at TCU. This designation provides the state of Mississippi with a greater level of access to TBRI implementation resources.

CASA's TBRI work is supported by the Velkas Child Welfare Endowed Fund in partnership with the Gulf Coast Community Foundation


