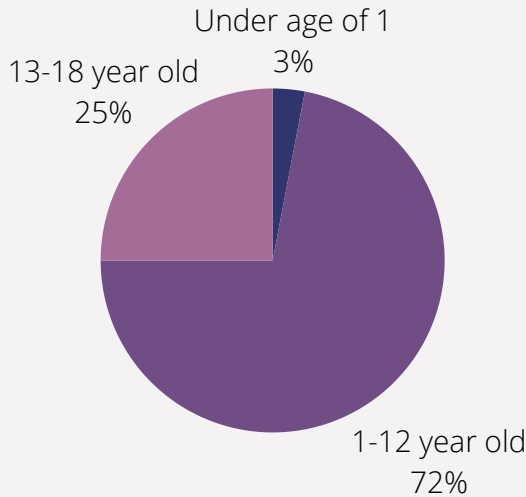

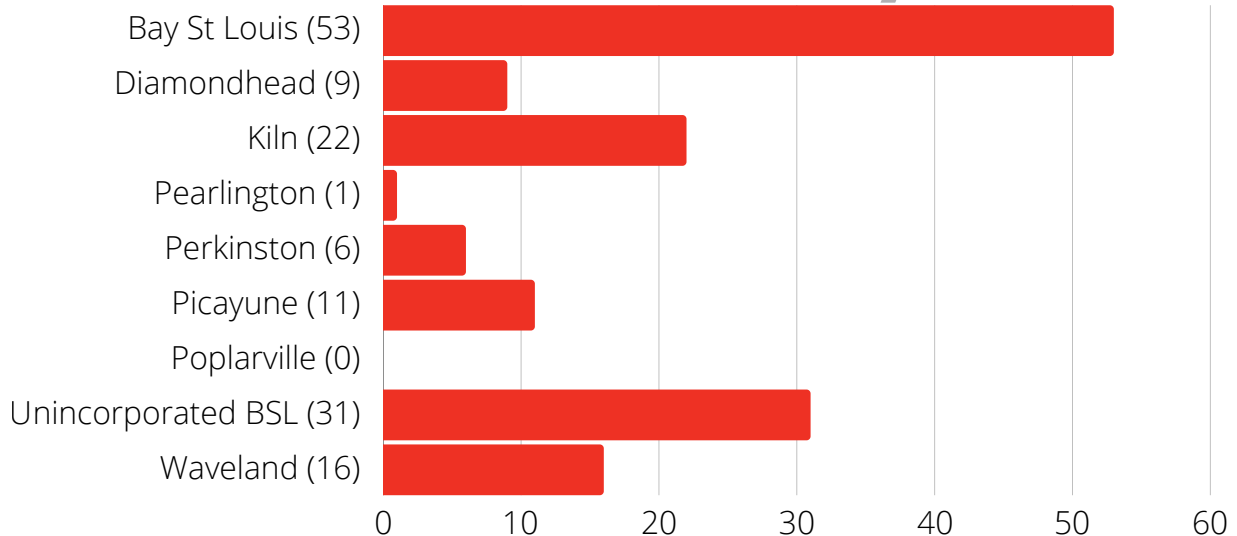

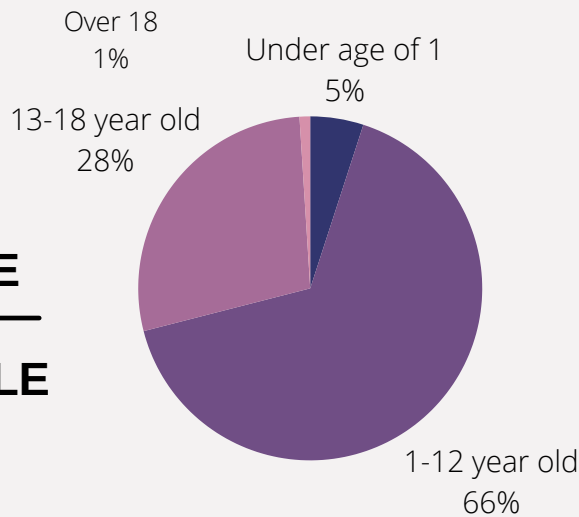

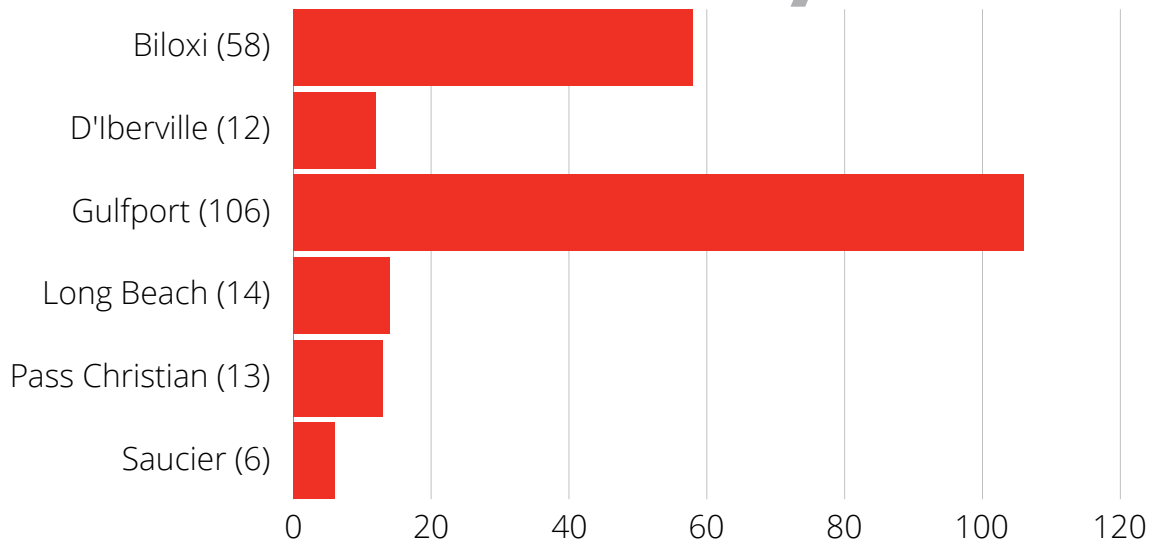

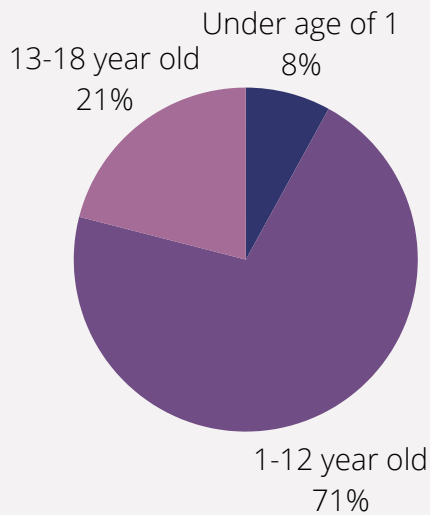

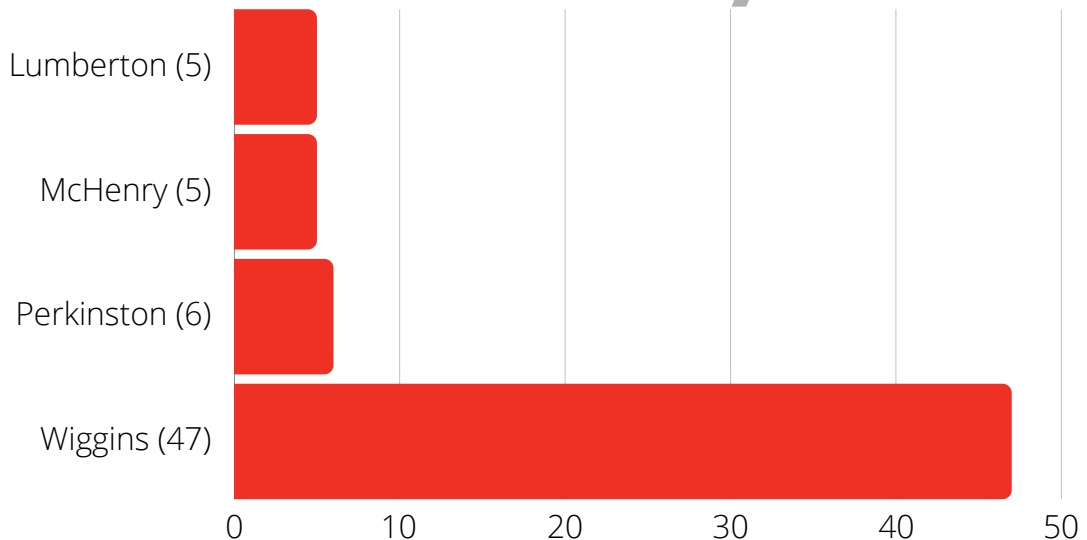

2026 GOALS

Goal 1

45 New Advocates

CASA will recruit, screen, train, & swear in 45 new advocates who will serve approximately 100 unserved children.

Goal 2

Serve 80% Children in Foster Care

CASA will serve 80% of children in foster care in Hancock, Harrison, & Stone Counties

Goal 3

80% Recommendations Become Orders of the Court

Advocates who make fact-based recommendations will have at least 80% become court orders

Goal 4

80% of Children Achieve Safe & Permanent Homes

Safe, permanent homes are achieved through reunification, adoption, & durable legal custody. Negative outcomes include aging out of foster care or running away.

Goal 5

80% Volunteer Retention Rate

The average CASA volunteer retention rate across the country is 65%. CASA of South Mississippi seeks to retain 80% of volunteers through ongoing staff support & engagement.

THE IMPACT OF AN ADVOCATE



“[My advocate] is one of the sweetest and most genuine women I have ever met. During times when I had little to no faith in myself, she was always there to remind me of my worth and potential.”

“I KNOW YOU!”



In one CASA case involving a sibling set of two involving physical abuse, advocate Diane was assigned to walk alongside them through an uncertain and complicated process. The children were moved out of Mississippi to live with out of state relatives.

At first, the children did not want to talk to her. The calls were short, offering little indication that a connection was forming. Still, Diane showed up consistently, understanding that consistency matters. So they continued video calls twice a month for a year and a half.

When the siblings returned to foster care in Mississippi, Diane was relieved to finally be able to visit the siblings in person. As soon as the door opened, this 8-year-old boy burst through the door, wrapped his arms and legs around her, and said, “I know you!”

That moment reflected the quiet power of advocacy. Even when distance, screens, and silence stand in the way, consistent support builds trust. Children remember who showed up.

CASA advocates do more than attend court hearings or write reports. They provide continuity in the lives of children who experience repeated disruption. With steady supervision and guidance, advocates like Diane offer something lasting: a reliable, caring adult presence.

This is why every CASA advocate matters. The impact is not always immediate, but when a child recognizes safety and connection, the value of that commitment becomes unmistakably clear.



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CHILD WELLBEING PROJECTS

REMI THE COURTHOUSE FACILITY DOG

Remi, the Courthouse Facility Dog, received extensive training from Canine Companions®. Facility dogs like Remi are selected for their ability to calmly interact with people in a high stress environment. Remi goes to work daily alongside her primary handler Naomi Strawhorn & secondary handler Linda Perkes at CASA of South Mississippi. While Remi primarily attends Youth Court with child victims, she may also accompany children to meetings with prosecutors or forensic interviews to enhance the fact-finding process. Off hours, Remi goes home with her handler and is a normal pet.

CHILD WELLBEING PROJECTS

TRUST-BASED RELATIONAL INTERVENTION®

Trust-Based Relational Intervention® (TBRI) is a trauma-informed intervention designed to meet the complex needs of vulnerable children. As Mississippi's designated TBRI Ambassador Organization, CASA continues to coordinate statewide TBRI efforts to assist children, families, and organizations in providing trauma-responsive care by establishing high levels of connection, felt safety, & regulation.

In consultation with the Karyn Purvis Institute of Child Development at TCU, CASA supports a network of TBRI Practitioners who serve in sectors including the child welfare system, mental health, schools, courts, juvenile justice, caregivers, residential settings, and more.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES

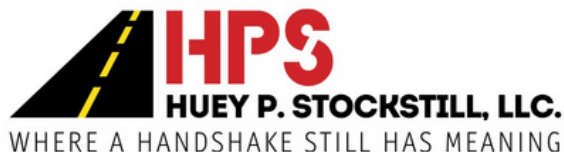

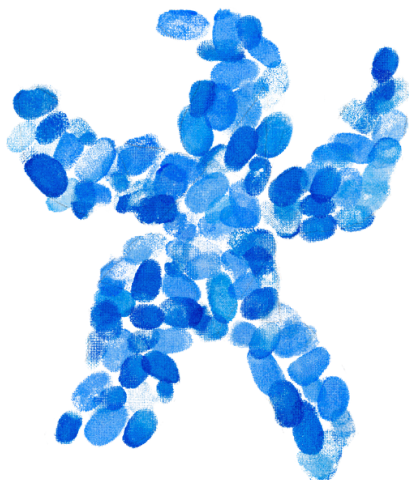

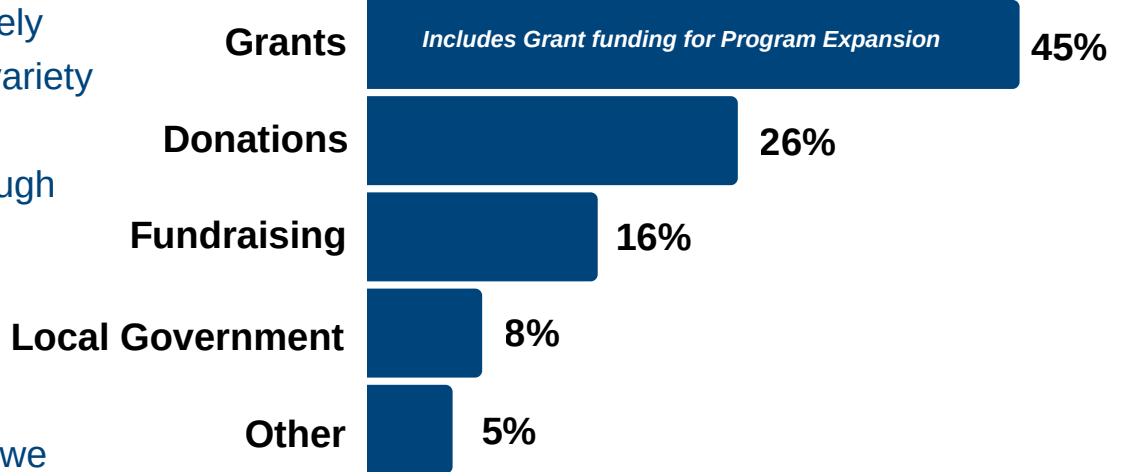
